# WELCOME FROM THE CHAIRS

During the unprecedented events of the last few years, the Grange Pavilion CIO, staff and volunteers have been amazing. We have remained fully open since May 2021, providing a vital service by supporting and facilitating programmes and space, including a food parcel delivery and advice service. We were welcomed back with a flurry of bookings and regular hires. These have included adult learning, homework clubs, parent and baby clubs, sports, dance, music, organisation away days, filming, parties, training, community consultation, mental health and as a polling station. We have also been affected by the Cost-of-Living crisis and high inflation, as many others have in the voluntary sector. To continue managing the Grange Pavilion sustainably and providing a vital service to the Grangetown Community, we have had to make difficult decisions such as increasing the basic rate cost of hiring out rooms by £5 per hour in the Grange Pavilion so we can continue to thrive.

As we continue to work and provide the community of Grangetown with a sustainable, high-quality community venue that is owned and managed by the community for the community, the collaboration and cooperation with partners and communities have been essential which is demonstrated by the impact we can have. We are proud of our achievements this year, especially as we look to stand on our own two feet following start-up funding from National Lottery, and as Cardiff University completes its Asset Guardianship with a handover of the 99-year lease to the Grange Pavilion CIO, which you can read about in this report. The hardworking staff team and Board continue to impress us with their knowledge and expertise - we want to thank our dedicated Board members, staff, partners, and volunteers who continue to devote their time and energy to achieving the best possible outcomes for the Grange Pavilion.

We'd also like to give our thanks to David Reeves, one of our former Trustees from Cardiff Bay Rotary, who has been with the Grange Pavilion project from the early days when we would gather at the previous building in the cold and wet. David and the Cardiff Bay Rotary have played an important part in the Grange Pavilion development, and we are stronger as a charity because of his passion, purpose and, of course, generous contributions to our project. A special thanks also to Greg and Lizzie, our board members who also are stepping down and have made an immense contribution and played an invaluable role in the last few years.

We firmly believe that our work is critical in supporting our local community and we look forward to the year ahead in developing more partnerships and working with more groups and communities to help the Grange Pavilion thrive.

# **SUMMARY**

Built in 1962, Grange Bowls Pavilion was a 134m<sup>2</sup> council-owned facility. Located in a popular green-flag neighbourhood park, the Pavilion was vacated following budget cutbacks and began to deteriorate. In 2012, Grangetown residents approached Cardiff Council to investigate how vacant facilities like this could be re-developed for widespread community use held and began holding activities in the Pavilion in 2014.

Between 2012-2019, community, Cardiff University and external partnership development supported consultation, engagement and co-production, testing community-led ideas, developing resident-led and externally delivered activities, and instituting community interest-based funding applications.

Construction began in 2019 with funding and in-kind contributions secured from National Lottery Community Foundation, Welsh Government, Garfield Weston Foundation, Moondance Foundation, Clothworkers' Foundation, HEFCW, Wales and West Housing, Taff Housing, IKEA, Cardiff Bay Rotary Club and more, alongside multiple individual donations.

Key principles underpinning redevelopment of the Grange Pavilion included the community-led activation of a civic space; co-production instead of consultation; concept-testing to evidence interest and need prior to developing a design brief; partnership design workshops at each stage of the process; a long-term commitment supporting the project long before and long after design stages; and the pursuit of design quality.

The transformed Grange Pavilion - comprising 600m<sup>2</sup> of community space with coffee shop and bathroom facilities, complemented by sustainable biodiverse green infrastructure and play areas, opened its doors to the 20,000-strong community of Grangetown in October 2020.

With the building fully operational and open to the public since May 2021, we have a variety of regular groups and users hiring the space. These have included adult learning, homework clubs, parent and baby clubs, sport, dance, music, organisational staff away days, filming, parties, training, community consultation, mental health, a polling station and much, much more.

# WE ARE GRANGE PAVILION

Grange Pavilion is a resident-led project to develop and revivify Grange Bowls Pavilion and Green, a former Cardiff Council property in Grange Gardens, transforming it into a multifunctional indoor and outdoor space for community activities.

This will deliver long-term social, creative, economic, educational and environmental benefit to the local community of Grangetown, which is Wales' most ethnically diverse ward.

Grange Pavilion aims do this by providing multifunctional indoor and outdoor spaces for community activities and incorporating a social enterprise café. The priority is to serve local people, by providing opportunities for education and training, creative practices, increased health and wellbeing, increased social cohesion and youth provision, and encourage more community action.

Our core aim is to benefit the residents of Grangetown, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, race or of political, religious or other opinions by associating together residents and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to provide facilities with the objective of improving the long-term conditions of life for the residents. But that sounds complicated!

# **OUR AMBITION**

The ambition underpinning the capital redevelopment focused on creating a welcoming, accessible, non-institutional civic space which demonstrates a sense of long-term civic quality.



# **OUR COMMITMENT**



Taking on a 99-year lease requires that we plan for the long-term community-led care of the Grange Pavilion, by having a viable business case while keeping the Pavilion affordable and accessible for community use.

# **OUR GROUNDS**

The redeveloped building seeks to uphold the park's status as a Green Flag park, matching the civic quality of a nearby Victorian bandstand, a listed bus shelter, and a historic Parkkeepers' Hut.



# **OUR PARTNERSHIPS**

Grange Pavilion is the resultant partnership project between residents' groups Grange Pavilion Project (GPP), Grangetown Community Action (GCA) and Cardiff University's Community Gateway project (CG).

Grange Pavilion was the first of over 60 partnerships initiated between Grangetown residents and Cardiff University over the past 6 years and has become the primary exemplar of how large institutions and hyper-local geographical communities can exchange knowledge and resources to coproduce strengths-based, strategies to transform our neighbourhoods.

The project is at the forefront of international action-research which is demonstrating not only how large organisations can act as equal partners at a local level, but also how all parties can coproduce mutually beneficial, systemic change.

In its role as short term asset guardian, Cardiff University is supporting the Grange Pavilion Charitable Incorporated Association (CIO) as its members develop the necessary skills, capacity and experience to take ownership of the Grange Pavilion by the end of the five-year funded period (February 2024).

Cardiff Council has supported the Grange Pavilion Partnership since 2014 and has worked alongside the team to transfer ownership of Grange Pavilion first to Cardiff University, and ultimately to Grange Pavilion CIO under a 99-year Community Asset Transfer lease.


#### **The Green Room**


#### The Blue Room


#### The Yellow Room

# THE HIDEOUT COFFEE SHOP

HIDEÖUT

The Hideout Coffee Shop has been open since 2018 operating in the original Grange Pavilion until it was closed for reconstruction. It reopened its doors in the newly built Grange Pavilion on the 5<sup>th</sup> October 2020 and has been a huge hit with Grangetown residents, and now employs three local residents to work in the coffee shop.





The Hideout (in partnership with Grange Pavilion) has received several pots of funding for breakfast club initiatives over the course of the pandemic, as well as Earth Hour funding to provide meal bags with recipe cards. The café also offers a 'coffee with a conscience' scheme offering patrons the opportunity to buy a coffee for someone less able to afford it. Vouchers to be claimed are on display in the window of the takeout hatch, making it easy and discreet to claim a free drink.

In addition to the delicious coffee and tasty cakes and toasties on offer at the counter every day, the Hideout can also offer catering for meetings or sessions booked at Grange Pavilion. Prices start from £65 for a refreshment package including refillable tea and coffee with a box of homemade cake slices, to £14.50 per person for a sandwich package which also includes crips and fruit platters.

# PROJECT UPDATES AND AWARDS

#### **Staff and Utilities Grant**

The funding from the Moondance
Foundation allowed for the Grange
Pavilion to operate and recruit three
members of staff on job share to
cover weekday evenings and
weekends. This has allowed for the
Grange Pavilion to be available for
hire to the local pubic, businesses and
organisations in the community.

#### **Winter of Wellbeing**

The sessions delivered from the Grange Pavilion by external organisations and Cardiff University representatives with relevant expertise in areas of expertise including art, play, youth work and STEM activities. The activities developed with the Grange Pavilion Youth Forum, a registered Community Interest Company that has been running weekly activities from the Grange Pavilion with children and young people from Grangetown. The Winter of Wellbeing timetable of activities ran over a 3-month period from 12 January to 31 March 2022.

#### <u>Together for our Planet:</u> Climate Action Café

We completed the project with a widening appeal of the gardening group and its related activities linked to climate change and encourage more people to get involved. We will be showing a commitment to taking positive climate action and encouraging others to do the same via our gardening activities. We will be lowering our carbon footprint via increased composting, planting and local food production. We will be providing opportunities for the development of new sustainable skills and open discussion about climate change. Our project as a whole encourages members of the local community to plan for climate emergency - to consider what climate action could mean to them and why it matters. We provided opportunities for the community to participate in positive climate action via our organic gardening and composting, and training events.

#### **Community Renewal Fund: Place Rangers and Apprentices**

Our project for this provided Green event days green event in Pentre Gardens. The event was catered by the Vegetarian Food Studios. Sam Holt from Eggs seeds ran two workshops. Amanda Micro Green-grocer ran a sushi-rolling workshop. There was a wonderful trip to Duffryn gardens, our green event day had a selection of eco friendly toys for sale and their toy library, to promote the circular economy. We also had much more for the community on our green day and other workshops in and around Grangetown.

#### **Food for Life Project**

This project is something that is run every Monday where a local organisation through Atma in Cardiff Central distribute 40 litres of food and we pack it up for the community. This is free for our community, and it feeds families in need.

#### **Magic Little Stars Grant**

Our community sewing group that we run free for every Wednesday from 6-7:30pm. This is run by volunteers and members of the community. This has helped bringing a diverse group together and helping to engage with members of the community that we have not yet been able to engage with. We have around 20-25 members turning up and enjoying the session weekly.

#### **Royal Society of Architects in Wales Awards 2022**

The Grange Pavilion, a centrepiece of Cardiff University's Community Gateway project, has been awarded two prestigious Royal Society of Architects in Wales (RSAW) awards for bringing about meaningful change to Cardiff's Grangetown community.

The project, which has transformed an old bowls pavilion into a thriving hub of activity for the community, was awarded the RSAW Welsh Architecture Award 2022, as well as the RSAW Client of the Year 2022.

The Pavilion was recognised as an 'extraordinary community project' and commended for exemplifying 'true collaboration' and for the impact that it has had on local residents.

# Double award success for Grange Pavilion

The Grange Pavilion, a centrepiece of Cardiff University's Community Gateway project, has been awarded two prestigious Royal Society of Architects in Wales (RSAW) awards for bringing about meaningful change to Cardiff's Grangetown community.

#### **Constructing Excellence Award 2022**

#### **Three Winning Facts:**

- 1. People using the Grange Pavilion describe it as a friendly, inclusive, accessible resource at the heart of the community, calling it a 'a space of belonging', 'an essential, dynamic new space' and 'an awesome hub for the community to sit, work and play side by side, breaking barriers.'
- 2. The project represents a commitment to the long-term care and management of a civic space, with the role of the architect embedded in the project long before design began and continuing into occupation to support the long-term success of the Pavilion. This building represents a deep collaboration and commitment to community-managed civic space.
- 3. Community members of all ages, faiths and interests in Wales' most diverse ward co-produced the design brief and detailed design decisions at every step over a ten-year period, working in a deep collaboration with the design team.

# **GP YOUTH FORUM UPDATE**

The Grange Pavilion Youth Forum consists of a group of young people (14-25 years old) from the Grangetown area that has developed over the last 8 years through the innovation and enterprise of young people in Grangetown. The Youth Forum recently became an independent entity as a Community Interest Company (CIC) in 2021.



The group provides opportunities for young people to support and engage in various activities in the Grangetown community such as the business forum, football clubs and University visits. Youth Forum members contribute to Grange Pavilion CIO through their presence on the Board, feeding into the wider work of the Pavilion and ensuring youth representatives can play a more central role strategically.



#### Some key achievements over the last year have included:

- Launched our Training Ground Youth Led Café in the Grangetown Hwb to support young people in gaining experience and employability skills in the hospitality sector
- Organised a Great Winter Get Together with the Jo Cox Foundation and brought together 70+ young people to enjoy fun, games and great food.
- Working with local artists on a new project 'Arts for Change' developing and having workshops on mask making, printing and filming to put a Grangetown Youth Arts Festival.
- Over the World Cup, through our partnership with Street Games, we created an atmosphere and worked on using football as a tool to engage young people and excited about the game.
- Funding Appeals Our amazing young people continued to respond to urgent needs around the world and pull together as a community. We raised £550 for the Türkiye – Syria Earthquake, £1000 for the Pakistan Floods and £5000 for Somaliland.
- Worked with the School of Earth & Environmental Sciences to engage young people about the environment, learning about the River Taff ecosystems and taking trips to Cardiff Bay and Brecon Beacons.
- Hosted a Youth Heritage Day on Somaliland for Black History Month
- Supported Young People from Grangetown to complete the Rotary Youth Leadership Award
- Held workshops with Flossy and Boo to learn about creative writing and storytelling
- Attend the Black Mountain College on their Ecological Camp
- Partnered with National Theatre Wales to work on their engagement and process on the show 'The Cost of Living'
- We took over 60 young people to Oakwood theme park in Summer 2022, lots of fun and engagement to cap a great end to the school year
- Worked with the School of Geography and Planning on the Grangetown Recovery Plan for young people
- The young people are also active volunteers for Cardiff University activities at the Pavilion including Careers and Role Model week.
- A new collaboration with SHARE school at Cardiff university, ACE, Fitzalan High School and Cardiff West High School looking at the past and history of Romans in Cardiff, connecting young people and heritage in a project called Roman 'Diff Fusion.


# **OUR BOARD AND COMMUNITY**

Volunteers have led the project's development since 2012 and will continue to develop the project as follows:

The Grange Pavilion CIO constitution states that at least 60% of the board must consist of Grangetown residents. The other 40% includes representation from organisations such as Cardiff University, RSPB, Cardiff and Vale College, Cardiff Bay Rotary Club and Taff Housing. This is to ensure long-term commitment to sustainability of the Board, as well as delivering volunteering, including community garden and Pavilion maintenance from Professional Services in Cardiff University and student volunteering from Cardiff and Vale College and Cardiff University.

















Grange Pavilion CIO members have initiated and delivered project activities such as the annual Winter Fayre and Grangetown Festival and regular Grange Pavilion activities including the Repair Café, Homework Club, Culture Café, Art Therapy Classes, Football peer mentoring and Sports for Children. Partnerships with organisations have supported volunteers in planning, training, leading and sustaining activities.

The Board will continue to work with Community Gateway team to hold the annual community consultation, outreach and planning event 'Love Grangetown' each autumn and ensure that Grange Pavilion CIO has a stall and section on the agenda to facilitate community involvement in the project delivery and ensure ongoing recruitment to prevent volunteer burnout and respond to changing needs and aims of the community.

We welcome new ideas, feedback and suggestions on how we can grow Grange Pavilion together to continue making it more inclusive and welcoming. If you would like to have a conversation, please get in touch a Board members.
